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Festival of King Island

The Festival of King Island (FOKI) takes place in the picturesque Currie Harbour and brings a broad range of Australia's best folk, blues, indy, funk, rock, country, jazz... and a bit of everything in-between. The quality of talent is comparable to other music festivals many times its size. The festival has a great vibe, it is a community event where you mix with the locals and some of talented musicians.

In addition to the great lineup they have a 100m waterslide (for risk-takers only), a raft race (where not all rafts make it back to the safety of land), and a pie-eating contest (not a pretty sight).

FOKI was an initiative designed to help King Island recover from the economic and social shock of closure of the second largest employer on the island. Kim Churchhill a musician wanted to help and visited King Island in February 2013 from that FOKI was born. The first festival was held using a small container, minimal equipment and six lights. They have come a long way from there, the event continues to grow and each year attracts some of Australia's best musical talent.







Miss K is a cabaret character created by Melbourne performer: Klara McMurray. After her debut as part of Mayhem Cabaret #13's Good vs. Evil, she has gone on to launch her own career.


Her first show: Love War Faith and a Singing Telegram (2007) was a satirical show performed on rollerskates about love gone wrong with blood-stained consequences, cult obsession and the masterminds pulling the strings.

Her second show: IL Mio Amore (2008) was set after an escape from prison when Miss K was forced to find a place to hide. Captain Funk suggested his home town Trieste,

Italy. She headed off in search of new beginnings, legal anonymity and maybe love, but what she found was a very different story. The satirical show explored food, loss, death, requited and unrequited love, and the gentle art of condom shopping in a foreign land. The show included the cooking of a traditional Italian dish.

Miss K is...Wrong.com! debuted at 2014's Adelaide Fringe Festival then went on to play at Brisbane's Anywhere Theatre Festival and Port Douglas' Carnivale.

Laura Hill writes whimsical songs with intriguing intimacy, full of love and purpose. With hints of youthful wisdom Laura's song writing is matched with a stunning clarity and tone to create a beautiful soundscape.

Laura's newest studio album 'Secrets' infinitely defines her stunning sound. Her fourth studio recording, it demonstrates a deviation from the somewhat laid back demeanour of her earlier albums Guava Tree and Blue Skies and greatly compliments her best selling solo release Powdered Sunshine from 2014. The songs here are emotionally raw, painfully honest and yet threaded with a singular bright positivity... swung from the heartfelt letter that didn't get through, to ballads of stargazing, shoegazing and road-tripping.

After touring nationally and with new found pride in her sense of place, Laura's home on the beautiful Fleurieu Peninsula helps define her impeccable indie folk sound. Secrets was recorded live in several stunning locations that clearly defines the releases ambiance. From Mixmaster's studio, known for its incredible acoustic warmth to the stunning stonewalls of a restored historic barn for the tracks Beautiful and Dreamer.

"On my travels I was often asked where have you been hiding? I believe there's something beautiful about discovering a secret destination or new experience that really resonates in your heart. If it's a tasty new coffee or the discovery of a great musician, when you find

something new it's like your own little secret discovery but the best part you ask? Just as quick as you find it you want to share it, after all life is best shared with the people you love right?" Laura Hill

In modern society where moments are fleeting and with Laura's belief that the best things in life are better shared, she chose to shun modern day smoke and mirrors for a release that is real and sure to pull you back to the simple things in life; the moments and people that really matter.

In all seriousness, it hasn't been an easy two years for the reserved Laura Hill with several life changing events causing a stumble and nearly stopping the release all together. During the recording and production process she became a new mother and in a brutal twist of fate, grappled with the news and complications around her cherished Mum, Dad and Aunty being diagnosed with cancer.

These events prove there is no doubt Laura is a lover, she has an undeniable desire to make the world a better place through her music and live performance, managing to establish connections on so many levels. No one gig defines Laura and as long as her music is touching the lives of her listeners she will continue to shine. Whether you're a lucky listener rambling along at a bustling market, fortunate enough to have her play at your wedding or a secret garden show, playing solo shows or at some of Australia's most cherished festivals, nothing is too big or small.

Hailing from neighbouring towns on the sleepy south coast of New South Wales, this hard-hitting alternative trio search for inspiration tucked away in a desolate corner of a local beach break.

Attempting to go un-noticed, slipping underneath the popular culture radar and cruising through life like the humble lads they are. However, this quiet, geographically inspired existence has created monster. Destiny has sowed it's ugly seed and thrust itself upon these three like a cheap suit on a Columbian drug lord, welding them into a musical trilogy and filling them with a burning desire to write music together.

Guns loaded with three Bachelor of contemporary music degrees: these unassuming boys crave for a world that does not look down its nose at creativity. A world where music is more important than politics. A world where respect is earned not purchased.

The Spindrift Saga is chuffed to be likened to the masters of the 90's alternative scene. The likes of Incubus, Chilli Peppers, Soundgarden, Rage Against The Machine, and The Stone Temple Pilots. The boys are not only comfortable with this assimilation, they are encouraged deeply by it. It was after all their original intention.

"Lets write stuff we love listening to... but give it some 'uni chops'. (Song writing philosophy- The Spindrift Saga)

Chris 'Mardi' McGrath is the dynamic front man and bassist. He makes singing and playing simultaneously so effortless that he is often paid two appearance fees. He is blessed with freaky coordination and if you shut your eyes and listen, he is literally two outstanding musicians rolled

Mick McGrath (yep that's right, they're brothers) on lead guitar and harmonies works tirelessly to ensure all guitar parts are a recognisable feature of the band's sound. Boasting solo chops with a focus on melody not 'diddly, diddly, diddly', he is insanely efficient and a noteworthy student of one of Australia's finest guitarist, Jim Kelly. Mick modestly fires riff after riff at the boys for critique. He is the unassuming guitarist and brings to the table a unique style, meshing technique and rawness.

Danny Freeman completes the trilogy on kit and likes what he sees from the 'engine room'. His powerful, yet refined drum parts are driven from a deep desire to be an equally important contributor to the band's sound. Danny attempts to refine stereotypical drum grooves by ensuring every last hit is orchestrated, meaningful and flooded with originality. He is a songwriter first and a drummer second, and understands that drum parts should be organised and enhance each and every composition. He is not happy until the grooves have a clear purpose and connection. Danny knows that 'less is often more' but sometimes 'more is just not enough' and pains tirelessly to construct parts that get the tick of approval from the whole band.

"No matter how good you think a drum groove is, it is useless until it enhances a piece of music. A good drum part is a song in itself. It has structure and meaning and feels complete whether it is simple or complicated" said Danny Freeman.

Killiecrankie Diamonds

A unique TOPAZ found only in the FURNEAUX GROUP OF ISLANDS.

Killiecrankie, in the north of Flinders Island is one of the most beautiful places in Australia, a real jewel, attracting many visitors. It is also the place where you can find the semi-precious topaz crystal and water-worn topaz pebbles in the creeks that flow off the granite of Mount Killiecrankie and into the bay.

The colour of these stones can vary from perfectly clear to pale yellow, blue and pink. There is also the legendary green diamonds of Killiecrankie but none have been found recently. Their capacity to be cut and faceted into brilliant gem stones has led them to become known as Killiecrankie Diamonds and feature in many fine pieces of jewellery.

Killiecrankie was one of the first gem localities discovered in Australia. In 1810 mineralogist, A.W.H. Humphrey found an abundance of topaz and the gems were exported to collectors in England and America. They were Australia's contribution to the British Empire's 'Great Exhibition of 1851' at the famous Crystal Palace.

Today Killiecrankie is a major gem stone fossicking destination where serious gem hunters and amateurs can try their luck at finding these stones. Recent finds have involved hard digging whilst to a lucky few... just picking up a glint of sparkle walking at low tide. It is important to be aware of the regulations and protocol regarding any serious fossicking.

Jeweller/Gold and Silversmith Sandro Donati, works with both the cut and natural stones at his K-Bluff studio in the village of Killiecrankie. He has developed a way of wrapping the natural stones in a pure silver bezel, or gold, which allows him to incorporate them in differing configuration for wearable art jewellery. He also works with those lucky people who happen to find these stones and together creates bespoke pieces of jewellery embedded with their personal Killiecrankie experience.

AN EXHIBITION BY MUSICIANS/ARTISTS SANDRO DONATI AND JUDY JACQUES

Judy Jacques and partner Sandro Donati have had a twenty year connection with the Furneaux group of Islands.

Judy was curious to find out about her forebears and discovered that they were, amongst other things, lighthouse keepers in and around Tasmania. Wanting to understand and experience this better she travelled to Flinders in 1998 to research her family history and the

connection to the Furneaux Group especially Goose Island and Deal Island Lighthouses.

The couple quickly became involved with the Islands' community and were invited to be artists in residence at the school in 1999, with further involvement and performances in the 2000 Wind Festival.

Judy spent four months living in a shack near Buffalo's Beach in the south of the island writing and recording her award winning song cycle CD 'Making Wings'. They fell in love with the islands and bought property in 2004, building a small house in 2005. Annual visits and a growing involvement with the artistic community grew over the ensuing years. They moved here permanently in 2011. They continue to be active in community arts and cultural networks such as the Furneaux Islands Festival.

Sandro studied Art majoring in Gold and Silversmithing at RMIT and graduated in 1972. Music, in particular Jazz, became a very strong passion and a major part of his life placing the Gold and Silversmithing on the shelf for quite a few years. His return the the jewellers bench was prompted by a numbers of factors not the least the birth of his first grandson. The desire to commemorate the occasion saw Sandro design and make a very special christening spoon that soon had other commissions coming in. An entry into the Nillumbik Art Prize entitled 'Memento Mori' in 2011 won a high commendation and was another validation to resume his practice as a gold and silversmith.

This exhibition features Sandro's art jewellery using Killiecrankie Diamonds, found objects, ordinary and semi-precious stones set in gold, silver, titanium and other metals. Also his charcoal and pencil drawings, painting, assemblage, collage and dioramas. At his jewellers bench he uses simple techniques such as hand forging, cuttlefish casting and fold-forming to create beautiful pieces of art jewellery and small sculptures.

Sandro currently works from his K-Bluff studio in Killiecrankie. He has exhibited at the Salamanca Arts Centre, Lovegroves Winery and Gallery, Montsalvat Art Gallery and at the Strait Works Gallery on Flinders Island. He work is in the McMillan Collection RMIT and in private collections around the country and overseas.

Judy Jacques has made a significant contribution to Australian Music since her beginnings in the early '60's. She enjoyed an early career as a Jazz Gospel singer and pioneered African American Gospel Music in Australia. The years that followed saw her developing an individual

style in contemporary music and improvisation. Visual art has always been a part of her life, especially living on Flinders Island. Her artistic practice includes poetry, Lino prints, pen and ink and other works on paper. She has built large papier-mâché figures for her live puppet performances with components of voice and sound installations.

For this exhibition her focus will be on works on paper, Lino prints and her unique photo montage techniques. This involves using photos of landscapes transformed by damaging events as backdrops for her Memory Theatre series. These constructed settings then become the stage for her collection of miniature farm characters and animals. The re-populated landscape are rephotographed and the prints finalised by hand.

Judy has exhibited work at Montsalvat and her Multi-Media work 'Theatre Memory One - Moorabbin Girls' was performed at the Composing Women's and Montsalvat Poets Festivals. She is included in the Montsalvat Jazz Roll of Honour. Her 'Making Wings' CD was awarded the inaugural Bell Award for Best Australian Jazz Vocal Recording 2003. in 2008 she was honoured by the Nillumbik Community Arts Committee for her contribution to the arts within the region. Her Fire Triptych was short listed for the 2013 Nillumbik Art Prize.

Both artists share an aesthetic that values the environment and the everyday fact of nature... above the thought of any place as 'Diamonds' for commercialisation.

ARTIST PROFILE

Jane Giblin

Making art about those who live and work within the Tasmanian landscape has pre-occupied Jane Giblin for a quarter of a century. Jane has spent days creeping around with deer hunters; has drawn shearers and wool sorters at dawn, and watched a stock hand slaughter sheep for his family. She has climbed hills and roved the many valleys of a Tasmania rarely seen by its usual visitors.

During the past two years she has been dealing with the working lives of her extended family: The Furneaux Island Willis family and their community.

This, her initial project about the Furneaux, aims to understand how isolated geography encourages community traditions. The resulting artwork is a testimony to generations of family enterprise and character, but it is also a reflection of much that has changed. The various working relationships between generations of families and the Indigenous community have existed for more than one hundred years. As a non-Indigenous descendent, she has been learning about the people, and their contexts, in their islands and waters, during this change. It is a complex microcosm of many other regional communities, across Australia.

"Ada and Sydney Smallfield, late 19th century settlers on Puncheon Island, were foster parents to my great grandparents, Olive and Valentine Willis. Olive and Valentine (Nana and Pop Willis) lived the first years of their marriage on Cape Barren Island, where they gave birth to their first children. They moved around the Flinders Island mainland until, through the soldier settlement scheme, Pop built a home for his family, of nine, at Ranga. These nine raised their own families, and many, wonderfully, on Flinders. The resulting 30 cousins now live all over the place! I have travelled from Sydney, to Summerleas, near Kingston south of Hobart, to photograph and interview these, the generation of my father, Max. I have also interviewed another 20 Flinders Island community figures, of senior years, and youth as well." said Jane Giblin

The project is, in part, collaboration with the esteemed

His poetic inquiry and highly pertinent, international expertise in island geography were brought to bear during their shared research and art making.

"I was delighted when Pete agreed to participate. As well as being a highly esteemed Tasmanian poet, he is a retired lecturer in geography and has written about island characteristics all over the world. This year, in the Furneaux, we explored the land and water-spaces, together, walking, boating, and flying. We have been delighted by the welcome and warmth of our reception, by all." said Jane.

On two occasions now, Pete and Jane have stayed in Mololo, a cottage on Franklin parade in Lady Barron. Once the home of the Smallfields, it now belongs to Jane and her husband, Phill Mason. This year, its walls have been covered with Jane's drawings and Pete's writing.

The resultant exhibition comprises of approximately 41 large works on paper, 30 photographic black and white portraits, at least 20 lithographs, as well as an artist's book, which includes Pete Hay's poetry and prose.

The Aboriginal Land Council of Tasmanian has been generous in their support for this project and that which can be learned about a century of island life, and in particular, the mutton birding industry.

The holder of two masters degrees, in lithography and painting, this Tasmanian artist has also produced work in Africa, Siberia, Japan, France and Iceland. Various regional galleries and private collectors around Australia hold her work. In Hobart, the Colville Gallery represents

I Shed My Skin: A Furneaux Islands Story will have its first showing at the Furneaux Museum, at Emita, on the west coast of Flinders Island, opening January 17th 2018.

It will travel to The Queen Victoria Museum and Art Gallery in March 2019, the Burnie Regional Art Gallery, in October 2019, and finally, the Colville Gallery in Hobart in early 2020.

This project was assisted through Arts Tasmania by the Minister for the Arts.

WCB's products include cheese, butter and butter blends, milk, cream and other dairy ingredients which are sold in Australia and to various customers around the world under well-known brand names including Sungold®, COON®, Cracker Barrel®*, Mil Lel[®] and Great Ocean Road Dairy™. Sales are across both the domestic and export markets.

WCB is a major regional employer in the South West of Victoria. In February 2014, Saputo Inc. acquired an interest of approximately 88% of WCB. In February 2017, Saputo Inc. successfully acquired additional shares to complete the acquisition of WCB.

HISTORY

The Warrnambool Cheese & Butter Factory Coy Ltd (WCB) was registered on 28 May 1888 and is Australia's oldest dairy company. It now operates under Warrnambool Cheese and Butter Factory Company Holdings Limited.

WCB was founded by a group of merchants and businessmen from Warrnambool and was in production less than six months from their first meeting.

Milk used in production was sourced from a small number of local dairy farmers.

Construction of the original factory buildings was completed on 13 September, 1888 and the official opening took place on 14 November, 1888.

The original 1888 factory buildings were demolished in 1897 and replaced by more modern and suitable premises. Unfortunately, on 25 November, 1913 these buildings were destroyed by fire, subsequently resulting in the erection of another new building, which was officially opened on 3 September, 1914 by Premier John Murray.

The original payment for milk was approximately 4 pence per gallon (4.5 litres).

In late 1889, all suppliers became shareholders.

Creameries began operating in 1890 at Mepunga East, Nirranda and at Lake Gillear the following year.

The first butter shipment from Victoria to London occurred in September 1893, with WCB butter comprising 80 boxes (approximately 10 tonne) of the consignment.

WCB commenced cheese production in August 1893.

By 1895, milk production from WCB's 180 milk suppliers reached 10,000 gallons or 45,000 litres per day.

A dairy factory located nearby at Garvoc was acquired in 1922 and was later used by Kraft Walker Cheese Company for cheese production. In 1935, WCB and Kraft Walker Cheese Company began an association which continues today.

Another disastrous fire on 6 February, 1929 destroyed almost the entire factory, including all records. Rebuilding saw the new factory completed in early October 1929.

QUEEN VICTORIA MUSEUM & ART GALLERY, LAUNCESTON

The Queen Victoria Museum and Art Gallery stands on the ancestral lands of the Stoney Creek nation, comprising the Tyerrenotepanner, Leterremairrener and Panninher clans. The Tasmanian Aboriginal people are the traditional custodians of the land on which QVMAG now stands and waters it adjoins.

The Queen Victoria Museum and Art Gallery (QVMAG) is a major destination for art, history and natural sciences in Northern Tasmania.

QVMAG is owned and operated by the City of Launceston with ongoing support from the Tasmanian Government.

QVMAG includes two sites in Launceston: the Art Gallery at Royal Park and Museum at Inveresk.

Their collection has been in the making since 1842, and includes significant acquisitions and donations from across the world. History, Natural Sciences and Visual Arts and Design are the key collection areas, cared for and exhibited for the community of Northern Tasmania.

They are continually working with the community and peers to build and better understand this extensive and diverse collection as well undertaking new research into both existing and new collections and research areas.

Open 363 days of the year, QVMAG offers a funfilled, educational and intriguing day out.

HISTORY

The beginnings of what is now the Queen Victoria Museum and Art Gallery come from collections of the Royal Society of Tasmania and the Launceston Mechanics Institute, founded in 1842.


The Museum itself, originally named the Victoria Museum and Art Gallery, was officially opened in 1891 at Royal Park. The project had been many years in the planning and was originally intended to be an exhibition. The State Government advised that it would prefer to fund a museum.

The Museum building was designed by a young architect by the name of John Duncan, whose design was chosen as part of a competition.

Originally the Museum had a caretaker but no curator. The first curator was Herbert Hedley Scott, who began the role in 1897. Scott quickly built an excellent reputation with his research and curatorship gaining international attention.

To avoid confusion with the Victorian State Museums, the Launceston City Council agreed to the amended title of 'Queen Victoria Museum and Art Gallery.'

The early collections focused on mineral specimens and natural sciences on the ground floor of the museum, with art displayed on its upper level. More space was needed, so in 1907 the first extension was built to house a zoological gallery.



In 1927 the museum gained a significant additional collection, with the purchase of the John Watt Beattie collection, a treasure trove of early colonial history and art, including an extensive convict-related collection.

Scott's successor was his son Eric who was also a well-regarded scientist, and also further developed the Historical displays. In the years following, more extensions were built and the collections and research continued to develop.

In 1998, the Museum began the development of a new site at the Launceston railway yards in Inveresk which opened in 2001. Six years later, the decision was made to create a dedicated Art Gallery at the original

Royal Park site with the Inveresk site concentrating on Natural Sciences and History. The flagship 'Tasmanian Connections' exhibition opened in 2010, and in 2011 the refurbished Art Gallery finally opened as a space dedicated to Visual Arts and Design.

Robyn McKinnon -Disappearing into Being

On display at the Queen Victoria Art Gallery, Royal Park 12 May - 11 November 2018

This exhibition surveys the work of Launceston artist Robyn McKinnon. One of Tasmania's most important contemporary artists, McKinnon has a stylistically diverse practice spanning over 40 years. This is the first largescale museum exhibition for the artist and brings together many of her most significant works.

Taking inspiration from her local surroundings, McKinnon's work transcribes memories of place and landscape, both real and imagined. Driven by a curiosity for the everyday; observations of her local community in Invermay, or walks through Cataract Gorge, are transformed into poetic works of art.

At times autobiographical, McKinnon's work ranges across both figuration and abstraction, revealing a perceptive pencil drawings, and object-based works.

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Princess Margaret Rose CAVE

Princess Margaret Rose Cave is one of Victoria's best kept secrets and is situated in the Lower Glenelg National Park. The cave is nestled on the edge of the spectacular Glenelg River Gorge with its stunning 50m limestone cliffs, riverside campgrounds, canoeing, fishing, HOW TO drives and great walks – everything for a great family holiday.

This limestone cave is often referred as 'the jewel in the crown' of the Lower Glenelg National Park. Carved out by tidal waters from the Glenelg River around 800,000 years ago this spectacular show cave is also a part of the Kanawinka Geotrail. For more information visit princessmargaretrosecave.com

The Interpretive Centre provides a visual display of how the Cave was formed, the discovery of the Cave by the early pioneers and the opening. A small kiosk and souvenir shop and information on the surrounding areas is available.

Enjoy the tranquil bush setting among Stringybark trees and natural bushland. Self-contained bush cabins await you or maybe pitch a tent or bring your van. All unpowered sites. Amenities block, a camp kitchen and wood fire pits. Relax by taking a river cruise from Nelson or drive and discover a wide variety of wildlife and plants

on your way. Enjoy the river by walking, water skiing, fishing, canoeing and swimming, or just sit back and relax the choice is yours. Take a tour - explore the beauty of the cave. Enjoy a 40 minute guided tour with an experienced guide. See stalactites, stalagmites, shawls, helictites and many other formations.

GET THERE

How to get there Princess Margaret Rose Cave and campground is accessible by road or by river cruise departing from Nelson Pier. The cave and surrounding park is located in South West Victoria, adjoining the SA border; about 450km from Melbourne, 490km from Adelaide, 29km from Mount Gambier and 17km from Nelson.

Glenelg River Gorge Stretching 15 km along the lower reaches of the river, this limestone gorge has cliffs up to 50m high in places. Limestone dissolved by water percolating through the rock has formed caves which host bat nurseries and roosting caves. Some caves have vertical shafts which, over thousands of years, have literally become death traps for unwary animals. The remains of long-extinct marsupials such as the Giant Kangaroo and the Marsupial Lion have been found in these caves, as well as remains of the Tasmanian Devil, now extinct on the mainland.







EXPLORING THE CITY ON TWO WHEELS

Cyclists can travel along the river past bush and billabongs, via major landmarks and always near a pit-stop for refreshments, Melbourne-style.

Perhaps the Melbourne skyline is best viewed from the top, but visitors wanting to zip easily from from galleries to parks and from rivers to stadiums, can grab a share bike and ride the Capital City Trail. The trail starts at the vibrant entertainment hub of Southbank, it winds along the grassy banks of the Yarra River past the Victorian Arts Centre, Royal Botanic Gardens, the MCG and Melbourne Park, and the elegant grandeur of historic Como House. Riders can pack a lunch and take a break by the Yarra River.

Down south at Port Phillip Bay, the Bayside Cycling Trail showcases St Kilda's popular attractions - Luna Park, Acland Street cake shops, St Kilda Pier and kiosk and the Sunday craft market on the esplanade. The trail is easily accessible from east to west. During the weekends and public holidays (10am-4pm), a small punt carries cyclists across the Yarra under the Westgate Bridge. Highlights on the western side of the Yarra include the historic bluestone Timeball Tower and Gem Pier, where the HMAS Castlemaine is open to the public (both in Williamstown), and Scienceworks in Spotswood.

ST KILDA BEACH, MELBOURNE

Heading east along with the gentle flow of the Yarra River, the Main Yarra Trail begins at Southbank and ends at Westerfolds Park, Templestowe. The trail can be taken at leisure spanning across 33km (duration: 5 hours). The trail takes riders along sports grounds, golf courses and the precincts on the edge of the parklands through typical Australian bush, wattles and eucalypts.

Beginning at Southbank, the Maribyrnong River Trail showcases the best of west. From Southbank the trail follows the Yarra River past the historic Polly Woodside sailing ship, then skirts the Docklands precinct and runs beside Footscray Road to the Maribyrnong River before winding past Flemington Racecourse, home of the famous Melbourne Cup. The trail will climb slightly to the scenic lookout at Lily Street rewarding cyclists with magnificent views along the river and of the city skyline. Continuing through native bushland and attractive river reserves, the trail passes under towering bridges of the Melbourne-Sydney rail line.


