In an emergency, time is of the essence – and Essendon Airport is well prepared to lend a helping hand, facilitating the swift, efficient response Victorians need to feel safe and taken care of.

As the base for many essential services such as Air Ambulance Victoria, the Victoria Police Air Wing, Maritime Search and Rescue and more, Essendon Airport has become a vital portal for emergency response, helping to provide safety and assistance when minutes make all the difference.

"The Victoria Police Air Wing and Air Ambulance Victoria combined handle around 6000 critical incidents per year, and a significant portion of those are through Essendon," says Graeme Ware, operations manager at Essendon Airport. "Because of our location and the facilities that we have here, it's an ideal base for all these services."

One of the busiest emergency services operating from Essendon Airport is Air Ambulance Victoria. With a fleet of helicopters and fixed-wing aircraft, they provide 24-hour emergency medical response that allows critical patients to be transferred from rural hospitals to specialist care in Melbourne quickly and safely.

"The important thing about the helicopters is they can get to remote locations and land close to where people are, so the paramedics can then get them stabilised and get them to hospitals very quickly," Mr Ware says. In addition to these helicopters, Air Ambulance Victoria operates four custom-designed planes that can assist paramedics and doctors in the treatment





of patients, with two neonatal emergency cots available for critically ill babies, as well as an upgraded stretcher system that can carry patients weighing up to 240 kilograms.

There are times when the helicopters are unable to land directly at the hospitals – if the wind is blowing the wrong way, for example, or if the visibility is not ideal. In these cases, it's crucial for emergency aircraft to have access to a modern airport, where the facilities allow safe landing at any time of day or night, in almost any weather conditions. "When they can't land at the hospital, they can know with confidence that they can land safely at Essendon 24 hours a day, and then it's just a quick trip in an ambulance down the freeway to a major hospital," Mr Ware says.

The location of Essendon Airport makes it an ideal base for such emergency services. Just eight kilometres from the CBD, it is the closest airport to major hospitals such as the Royal Melbourne Hospital, the Royal Children's Hospital and the Royal Women's Hospital. This means the chances of beating what emergency and medical professionals call "the golden hour" are greatly increased.

"If you can get someone who is suffering a trauma into a major hospital within 60 minutes, the chances of their survival and improved recovery time is much higher," Mr Ware explains. "By beating the golden hour rule, you can save lives just by virtue of doing things quickly." Getting critical patients into hospital within the hour can also reduces the amount of time spent in







hospital and the reliance on the health system for ongoing care, saving resources as well as lives.

The convenience of location also benefits other crucial emergency services based at Essendon Airport. The Maritime Search and Rescue jet is sent out to look after the coastal areas around Victoria and Tasmania when required, and the Victoria Police Air Wing has four helicopters ready to provide safety and assistance in a wide variety of incidents. During our hot, dry summers, a fleet of bushfire helicopters are also based at Essendon, with Elvis the Erickson air-crane leading the mission. Specially designed to be used for fire detection, aerial reconnaissance and firebombing, the versatile air-crane is equipped with a

9,000-litre water tank, which can be filled from a dam or reservoir in a matter of

As well as these major emergency response services, a small fleet of general aviation aircraft is sent out every morning to hospitals and medical centres around regional Victoria, delivering crucial medical supplies. Essendon Airport is also home to Angel Flight, a charity that co-ordinates non-emergency flights for patients, carers and family members from regional areas of Victoria who face daunting distances to reach medical treatment centres.

Together, all these services play a vital role in keeping Victorians safe and protected. "We have become a real hub for emergency services, and it's good for everyone," Mr Ware says. "All these services are able to operate 24 hours a day, and I think that's a comfort to people."





EXPERIENCE A NEW WORLD ON KING ISLAND

Utter the words King and Island anywhere in mainland Australia (and in a few more far-flung locations) and you can be fairly certain of the response. Most people have little idea where to find King Island but they know that they love the cream, cheese, beef, garlic, crayfish and honey. Typical responses include, "Tasmania... really?" "A short flight from Victoria... are you sure?"

And when you arrive on King Island, strolling the empty beaches, chatting to friendly locals down the main street, it's easy to see why many people would have more luck identifying Hong Kong on a map than they would King Island. (Hong Kong interestingly is almost exactly the same size as King Island but with a population some 5000 times larger!) King Island is hard to pin down, difficult to describe and so very different to other places you might visit for a holiday.

One thing King Island most certainly isn't is modern. While you may miss the whole Wi-Fi-while-you-sushi experience, you're unlikely to miss some of the less appealing features of modern life such as traffic (or traffic lights), high rise buildings, shopping malls and pollution. That's not to say that you can't have new experiences on King Island – two new world class golf courses are currently under construction to complement the award winning 9-hole course in Currie, new horse riding

Considering the small population of King Island there are a disproportionate number of artists and artisans working away in splendid isolation. In addition, the King Island Arts and Cultural Centre often has visiting artists, artists in residence and incredible arts projects at various times through the year so make sure you give them a ring for details of upcoming events (03 6462 1924).

10.00AN

You can't appreciate art on an empty stomach so start the day with a healthy and delicious breakfast or a coffee at Renae's Café and make sure you cast your eye over the works of art and craft on the walls and shelves of this recently-refurbished favourite.

11.00AM

It's only a short stroll to the King Island Historical Museum, located on Lighthouse Street. They have a fantastic collection of information and artifacts pertaining to local history. Don't miss the original Fresnel lens from the Cape Wickham Lighthouse which was recently discovered in WA and returned to King Island for display.

12.00 MIDDAY

Lunchtime already? Maybe head back to Harbour Road Café for some of their homemade soup or delicious fresh scones or alternatively pick up a fresh salad roll from the King Island Bakehouse and find a beautiful beach for artistic inspiration while you eat lunch.

1.00PM

Head down towards Naracoopa where you'll find the newly-opened Abalone Art Gallery specialising in art and craft, inspired and created from material washed up on the shore.

2.00PM

Portside Links Gallery in Grassy displays art by local artists in a beautiful setting. If you have time, try one of their locally-made cakes with your refreshing afternoon tea. While in Grassy you should also try to visit King Island Kelp Craft and marvel at the ingenuity of Betty and Bevin who specialise in this unique form of handcraft.

3.00PM

The Darriwill Farm Story

The Darriwill property is situated on the junction of the Moorabool River and Sutherlands Creek. The bluestone homestead was completed in 1856 by George and Marianne Hope, and was set up as a grazing property and vineyard. Where the vineyard once stood on the eastern slope, there is an extensive planting of mature bunya-bunyas, pines, olives, and a copse of claret ash and elm trees.

The immediate surroundings to the house were extensively replanted in 1994, when the present owners, Dougal and Nellie Ramsay purchased the 840-acre property.

The garden boasts a magnificent cork oak tree, which is nearby to the original winery building, built in 1863. On the south side of the house is an extensive vegetable garden, with wonderful views down to the river valley and the original orchards.

A large lake has been built on the northern side of the original farm buildings, which the owners have planted out with tree species native to the area.

The owners, Dougal and Nellie Ramsay, have set out on a journey to create a chain of retail stores that embraces all of the lost qualities of the traditional Australian country store. Dougal's passion for preserving many aspects of Australian rural life comes through in his artwork. Trained as an illustrator, his work is found in many private collections both here and overseas.



Cider-glazed free-range Flinders Island pork loin, with parsnip and potato puree, braised red cabbage and seasonal steamed vegetables.



500ml Apple cider 80ml Honey

- 3 Garlic cloves, crushed
- 1 Cinnamon stick
- 2 Stare anises
- 1 large red chilli split
- 3 tablespoons red wine vinegar

80g Red currant jelly

To make marinade, place cider, honey, garlic, cinnamon stick, stare anise, chilli, vinegar and red currant jelly in a bowl. Mix to combine ingredients. Score the pork loin diagonally and place it in the marinade coating it well, cover and refrigerate overnight.

Heating the oven to 200c transfer the pork to a roasting tray cover with foil and roast for roughly 40 minutes.

Place the reaming marinade into a saucepan, bring to the boil then reduce to a simmer until desired thickness is achieved. Pass the glaze through a strainer removing stare anise, cinnamon stick and chilli.

Rest the pork before serving

Rhinos celebrated at Werribee Open Range Zoo 21 SEPTEMBER – 6 OCTOBER

Come on safari this spring to see Rhino Leeroy and his friends at Werribee Open Range Zoo.

Throughout the school holidays from 21 September to 6 October, kids can enjoy a range of rhino games and crafts, learn the Rhino Rap and track the zoo's magnificent rhinos across the African Savannah.

Rhino Rap is free for Kids under 15 and included with general entry to the zoo.

Exploring the world from a rhino's point of

view, kids will get to make their own rhino horn and test out their stamping skills to create rhino tracks.

There'll be plenty of singing and dancing to the Rhino Rap – created by ten of Victoria's most talented kids with rap artist, Hugo, rhino jokes to learn and interactive shadow play.

Young children will also enjoy imaginative play, with plush toy rhinos that they can hand-rear.

All of the activities are free and included with general admission to the zoo. As part of their entry, visitors have the opportunity to tour the African Savannah on a safari tour, tracking rhinos, giraffe and zebra.

For families looking for something really special, an overnight stay at the Slumber Safari Camp (complete with luxury tents, the early morning roar of lions and views of the Savannah) can also be arranged.

Sadly there are just over 20,000 Southern White rhinos in the wild and their survival is threatened as the demand for rhino horn increases.


If you are not actively managing your superannuation, chances are that no-one else is either, regardless of the management fees and other fees that are being charged on your superannuation account.

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
